
Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet



Director's Notes

We are, all of us, Romeo and Juliet. So familiar are we with the two lovers consumed by passion, that the roots of their story strangle the heart of love before it even lives. Our familiarity may stem from knowledge of the play itself or, like Romeo and Juliet, we too may have felt the devastating and tragic effects of a passionate love turned – like death, to heartbreak. Perhaps for some of us, we are only too well familiar with it.

It is here the difficulty of producing Romeo and Juliet can be found. Since we all know the ending before the love story begins, why do we choose to do it? It is in this quandary that I am captured by the play, and in this difficulty, its true universality is found. Though we know that tragedy of heartbreak lies ahead, like Romeo and Juliet we have no choice but to ignore love's dark promise because, we still desire to possess it. And desire it we do – with as much passion and ignore-ance as the central characters of the play. This is where Romeo and Juliet possesses its resonance. In the desire, the willingness to possess true love no matter how great the cost.

Shakespeare himself was aware of this profound human quandary and with his prologue accounts for the ultimately tragic path of love before he even begins his great love story. Like Shakespeare then, our production accounts for it as well. As a "company of actors" we start the play in full awareness, (much like our private love affairs) with full knowledge of the dark promise for its inevitable outcome. We, not innocent and still hopeful, proceed against all odds. Here too in knowledge, our Romeo and Juliet are not tender innocents - aged 14, but are seasoned lovers who are tortured by tender hearts. Though aware they may suffer intense pain of the heart, they unavoidably – though knowingly, still, as Romeo says "...venture for such merchandise."
